






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Number of Learners With Honors



This graph illustrates the progression of learners from Grade 1 to Grade 6 who attained an average score of 90%-94% in Quarters 1 to 3 of the 2022-2023 school year, making them eligible for the prestigious "WITH HONORS" award. The data reveals a consistent upward trend in the number of recipients each quarter, except for Grade 3. Specifically, Quarter 1 witnessed **80** learners achieving the with honors distinction, which escalated to **114** in Quarter 2 and further increased to **153** in Quarter 3.








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Number of Learners received Most Improved in Reading Award



This graph shows the number of learners who received the "**Most Improved** in **Reading**" award every quarter for the school year 2022-2023. In Quarter 1, there were **8** learners who showed improvement in reading, and they were from Grade 2 and Grade 3. In Quarter 2, there were **24** learners from grades 2, 3, and 4 who demonstrated improvement. In Quarter 3, a total of **96** learners made significant progress in reading, transitioning from Grade 1 to Grade 3.

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
